

Dream Come True!





"People just don't understand."

We all wear different hats daily. I'm a Mom, Wife, Landlord, Farm Owner, Barn Volunteer, etc. However, one of the most difficult hats that I wear is a "Therapist" hat. This is what Judy and I jokingly call our frequent conversations (sometimes daily.) I don't really do anything except listen. Some of you may remember Judy and Abby's story from one of the 2020 newsletters. Briefly, they adopted one of our ranch horses named "Willow" thinking they would rescue this horse but as it turns out, the horse rescued them.

During one of our most recent chats before Christmas, Judy told me of the presents she was getting for her kids, her Dad and of course Willow. As she rattled off all of Willows items, I'm shaking my head the whole time. This list included 13 different flavored bags of horse treats; cinnamon, pina colada, ginger, rocky road, banana, anise, butterscotch, vegetable, party oats (what could this possible taste like?!), peppermint, carrot & oats, strawberry and alfalfa.... all for ONE horse. I laugh and tell Judy she's crazy but of course she knows this. Then Judy proceeds to tell me, "Oh how I love that horse. Mish, people just don't understand. They look at Willow and see an animal. Unless you've walked through what we have, you just can't understand." Judy has told me on endless occasions about the natural healing that occurs when she or Abby are with Willow. Then she proceeded to remind me about the worst night of her life when her husband died. After suffering the devastating effects of a stroke, Dave hung on for two and a half years and passed away in March of 2020. Dave died on a Friday and Judy and Abby (as well as her son David) were overwhelmed with grief, they didn't know what to do. They decided they would go to the barn and check on Willow, maybe take their mind off Dave's death for a few minutes. As soon as they walked into Willow's stall, they remembered how much Dave loved Willow. Both Abby and Judy started to cry. Willow lowered her head and let them weep all over her. She remained like this for at least fifteen minutes, not moving a single muscle. They didn't think they had that many tears in them but it was like a dam just busted. Willow's hair was saturated in large patches all over her body. Willow could sense they were suffering and simply "listened" like a therapist would.

After Judy finished recounting the story I had to concede. I said, "Ok Judy, maybe you're not so crazy for buying her 13 different bags of treats. I'll give you that one." And we both chuckled a little bit.

I share this story, not to bring sorrow to your life, but to help you see that even when there is darkness, God provides help to carry the load. He is always near to the broken hearted. Sometimes when we need something tangible, he uses people, His word or even animals.
