

# The Table that Became a Well

When we moved the ranch to the current location in 2016, we did a lot of clean up. The hay mow (main upper floor of the barn) had almost 2 feet of loose hay and chaff from the previous tenant. When we went to clean it out, we found broken glass, old suitcases, pieces of furniture, oil cans and other trash. But we also found this 4 ft x 4 ft, butcher block table top. It was 4 inches thick of solid hardwood and heavy as can be. I thought it would make a great table, it just needed legs. So we bolted some 4 X 4 posts on and made legs. This table sits in the breezeway at the entrance to our barn. It greets every visitor and is an inviting place to sit and rest. Even though it sits under cover, it is still exposed to a lot of weather. When one of our volunteer groups came this summer to do maintenance work at the ranch, refinishing this table was on their list of things to do.

As I was leaving the ranch that day, I saw three volunteers working on the table, I stopped them and thanked them and explained that they weren't just sanding a table.

I explained that over the years, this table had become a "family center" to so many kids. It was at this table where we had many discussions about life and its difficulties. It is also where we share about Jesus. It was also the lunch table for kids of our county camp. We run a special summer program for the local county juvenile services, which includes lunch. Volunteers have generously supplied warm, delicious cooked meals. Because we have tried to be good stewards with the finances we are given, we decided to accept an offer from the United Way when they offered to provide free lunches for the kids. We never want to seem ungrateful, but the meals were mostly like school lunch style with sandwiches, fruit and milk cartons. Sometimes the meat or cheese was frozen. You could tell the atmosphere at the table had changed. Where there was animated conversation before, now the kids were mostly quiet and many skipped the trays and cold food.

When I saw the difference, I realized how important the warm, home cooked meals were. Most if not all of these kids do not sit down for dinner with their family on a regular basis. We sat down at this table once a week

w/ each group of kids, like a family. We shared the meal, looked them each in the eyes and had caring conversations. At this table, they learned that there were people that cared about them. Cared enough to prepare them a home cooked meal, cared enough to ask them, "How have you been since we saw you last week?" They also saw (in the volunteer interaction w/ one another) how God calls us to treat one another with love and kindness. Tears have been shared at this table, as well as laughter and celebrated accomplishments.

It's impossible to convey to volunteers the impact of their service. How can scooping poop, scrubbing water buckets, sanding and refinishing a table help hurting kids? Every act of service from our volunteers puts a drop in a well. A well from which the kids can take what they need, whether its time with a horse, time with a mentor, an ear to bend or someone to hug them on a really bad day. I like to think of this well as a well of love and hope. Volunteers fill it and the kids draw from it.

# When the Music Stopped

.....Once again, I have to apologize for the six-month gap in communication. Many of you are probably ok with that as I too hate being inundated with emails, junk or not. Our goal is to share with you, our supporters, what is happening at the ranch, including how God is using us to affect those we serve. I never want RYYR to be about me, and that is why it is difficult for me to write this. I realize I have become the "face" of the ranch. However, many of you have noticed that you haven't seen my face around much this year. As with most of the stories I share, there is pain and struggle but also hope and it is because of the hope that I feel compelled to share.

I am one of those people that has music in my head all the time. It could be the last song I heard playing in the grocery store that would be stuck in my head all day. I hummed a lot, while I cooked, while I folded laundry, while I worked. My niece called me Aunt Hummy. Just can't help it. Out of nowhere, this year I became an insomniac. That is when the music stopped.

Because my life was always so full and busy, I was exhausted and I slept long and hard. Never had trouble sleeping and all of a sudden, I wasn't sleeping. It got really bad in June. As tired as I was, I couldn't even nap during the day. I felt like a zombie, I could barely function. I withdrew from people, activities, responsibilities and life in general. Every day I would wake up so tired and count the hours until I had another chance to sleep again. Many days I cried and wished away my existence. I didn't want to die, but I didn't want to live like I was. When you don't sleep, you're mentally and emotionally wrecked. For the first time in eleven years, I did not serve at the ranch. No barn chores, no mentoring, nothing. My life was traveling 75 mph and then I hit a brick wall.

I tried getting help medically. Doctors don't know what causes insomnia (nor do they try to figure out why you have it), they simply treat the symptom with a pill (or many different pills.) Pills come with many side effects, some worse than the lack of sleep. Over the counter supplements can be just as bad. In this time of serious trial, I have been pushed to the brink. I find myself questioning my faith. I begged God to heal me, to help me, to fix me. How could I serve him in this condition? Why would he leave me in a state in which I was no good to him? Why was he so silent while I was suffering? I was sad, tired, angry, frustrated and weepy all the time. I was so tired of praying and begging him and getting no response. So I stopped. I quit praying and connecting with God. Why bother, right?

But disconnecting from God made things worse. Without Him, I have no hope. Zero. In my time of trial and suffering, God showed up in ways that I didn't expect. For starters, many people stepped up to fill the voids I left. It took a lot of people and a lot of time. I've learned that I will not make or break this ranch. This ranch is His and He will make it happen, every day. Apparently, he wanted me to rest. I am learning that I need to lean into God, not lean away, and my only hope is in Him.

Some days I feel like my old self. Some days are just rotten. I am not the same high energy person, on fire with passion for God. God had taught me that even though I can't serve him right now, my value is not in serving him, my value is in being his child. I am not used to this. I am sure some day when I look back at this season in my life, I will understand why God took me out at the knees. But for now, I have good days and I have bad days and God has given me the grace to sustain me each day and that has to be enough until he heals me.

Many people have prayed for me and comforted me when I was inconsolable. Those kind words and encouragement helped me put one foot in front of the next one. Some days are still like that, just taking the next step, living one day at a time. But for now, I will remember the words that a fellow ranch lover and insomniac said to me:



"You have been on my heart and mind since I talked with you yesterday. When I was up in the night (as always), I prayed for you. Please know that even exhausted and tired (and maybe, if you are like me, even grumpy), God is using you in ways we can't even imagine. I took these photos a couple of weeks ago on my way to the ranch. Maybe when you look at them, you can be reminded that God keeps his promises. Even though in Noah's case he had to go through a year of storms before the rainbow."

......and recently, I caught myself humming while I was doing dishes. God is faithful even when I am not.

The current low quality rubber mats that protect the main floor of the trailer are crumbling under hooves. It is time that we replace the mats, investing in a high-quality product that will last RYYR forever is the goal here. After some research, WERM brand was discovered.
